PREAMBLE FOR PROCEDURAL AND INTERPRETATE RULES RELATING TO GUN REPAIR SHOP EXEMPTIONS

PROGRAM: Law Enforcement

REGULATIONS: Gun Repair Shop Exemptions, Series IV-G (Procedural) and Series IV-H (Interpretive).

AUTHORITY: West Virginia Code, Chapter 20, Article 2, Section 58; Chapter 61, Article 7, Section 12; and Chapter 29A, Article 3.

ACTION: Proposed Rules and Request for Comments

TOPIC: Series 4G establishes procedures for granting gun repair shop operators exemptions from the law prohibiting the discharge of a firearm within five hundred feet of any dwelling house or within four hundred feet of any schoolhouse or church. Series 4H provides guidance to gun repair shop operators concerning safe test firing sites.

DATES: A public hearing will be held on Monday, November 17, 1986 at 3:00 p.m. in the Director's Conference Room 674, 1800 Washington Street East, Charleston, West Virginia. Comments will be received until the close of business on Wednesday, November 19, 1986.

SUMMARY: Under Sections 20-2-58 and 61-7-12 of the West Virginia Code, the Director is authorized to grant exemptions to the operators of gun repair shops which allows the test firing of a firearm under certain circumstances. The Director may grant such exemptions provided that he "shall ensure that any person residing in any dwelling home within five hundred feet of such gun repair shop be given an opportunity to protest the granting of such exemption."

The Department's proposed rulemaking addresses two of the four possible exemptions available under Sections 20-2-58 and 61-7-12 of the West Virginia Code. Under the proposed procedural rules (Series IV-G), the operator of a gun repair shop may be granted an exemption to allow the test firing of firearms (1) within five hundred feet of any dwelling house and (2) within four hundred feet of any school or church. Series IV-G establishes the procedures to be followed and the form to be used in applying for this exemption. The proposed rules also set forth the manner in which objections to a grant of exemption will be addressed. The

proposed interpretive rules (Series IV-H) provide guidance concerning safety requirements to be followed by gun repair shops under a grant of exemption.

The Department is not proposing rules on the other two categories of exemption: (3) the discharge of a firearm "across or in any public road in this State" or (4) the discharge of a firearm "on or near any park or other place where persons gather for purposes of pleasure." We decline to adopt rules for these exemptions for several reasons.

Statutory amendments in 1985 created the four categories of exemptions and provided the Director with the authority to promulgate rules to govern the granting of such exemptions. When creating the exemptions, the Legislature sought to assure that relevant members of the public had the right to protest the granting of an exemption. Members of the public who are allowed to protest can be clearly identified for exemptions granted for test firing within five hundred feet of a dwelling or within four hundred feet of a schoolhouse or church. The statutory amendments do not however provide any guidance for identifying the relevant public for the other two categories of exemption. Therefore, the Department is not establishing procedures for protest in cases where the group upon whom the Legislature intended to convey the right of protest cannot be readily identified.

The Legislature specifically granted the right of protest to "any person residing in any dwelling home within five hundred feet of (a) gun repair shop." Using this as a guide, the Department has extended the right to protest a gun repair shop exemption to: "the principal, school personnel, and the parents of students of any schoolhouse located within four hundred feet of a test firing site" and "any member of a church located within four hundred feet of a test firing site."

Identifying relevant members of the public for the two remaining categories is not easily accomplished. It appears that the Legislature intended to grant the right of protest to individuals who would be affected by an exemption, such as persons residing within five hundred feet of the gun repair shop. The Department is reluctant to use a broader definition of identification due to the administrative unworkability and inherent unfairness in extending the right of protest to any member of the public who may use a public road or who may gather at a place "for purposes of pleasure." The Department does not know of an adequate method for notifying such categories of people of their right to protest. Any method would be either too expensive or fail to reach all of the potential users and, thus, would be inherently unfair.

There exist other reasons for not adopting rules covering these two categories. First, the Department does not know how the Legislature intended the phrase "places where people gather for purposes of pleasure" to be interpreted. Second, the Department

does not believe that it would be proper to issue exemptions that would allow the test firing of firearms across or in public roads. Consequently, today's proposed rulemaking addresses procedures for only two of the four categories contained in Sections 20-2-58 and 61-7-12 of the West Virginia Code.

WEST VIRGINIA ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS 6 PH 2: 17 Department of Natural Resources Series IV-H Gun Repair Shop Exemptions

Gun Repair Shop Exemptions Interpretive Rules

Section 1. Scope and Authority

- 1.1 Scope and Purpose. The purpose of these rules is to provide guidance concerning safety requirements to be followed by gun repair shops under a grant of exemption.
- 1.2 Authority. These rules are promulgated under the authority of the West Virginia Code, Chapter 20, Article 2, Section 58; Chapter 61, Article 7, Section 12; and Chapter 29A, Article 3.
- 1.3 Effective Date. These rules will be effective 30 days after filing.
- 1.4 Filing Date. These rules were filed on ______, 1986.

Section 2. Definitions

- 2.1 Applicant means the operator of a gun repair shop duly licensed under applicable federal and state laws.
- 2.2 Exemption means an exemption from the law prohibiting the discharge of a firearm within five hundred feet of a dwelling house or within four hundred feet of a schoolhouse or church.
- 2.3 Person means also the plural "persons" and includes individuals, partnerships, corporations, or other legal entities.

Section 3. Nontransferability

- 3.1 A grant of exemption may not be transferred to another person.
- 3.2 A grant of exemption is void upon the bankruptcy, sale, or cessation of the applicant's gun repair business.

Section 4. Safety Requirements

- 4.1 All test firing done under a grant of exemption will be by the gun repair shop operator, his paid employee, or the owner of the firearm being repaired.
- 4.3 All test firing will be done into a safe backstop or bullet trap.

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Section 5. Revocation of Exemption

- 5.1 Failure to maintain a safe test firing area may result in the revocation of the grant of exemption.
- 5.2 Revocation of a grant of exemption may result in the imposition of criminal penalties as prescribed in Chapter 20, Article 7, Section 9 of the West Virginia Code.

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
