WEST VIRGINIA ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

Department of Natural Resources

Chapter 20-1
Series IV

Subject: 1973-74 Hunting and Trapping Regulations

By virtue of the authority granted to the Director of the Department of Natural Resources by Article 1, Chapter 20 of the Code of West Virginia, the following hunting and trapping regulations are hereby promulgated and shall become effective at 12:01 a.m. on February 25, 1973 and shall expire at 12:00 p.m. February 23, 1974, unless otherwise amended or new regulations are issued by the Director.

Section 1. Definition of Terms Used

1.01. Possession limit -- means game which is in any way under control of the hunter. Example: the total of all game in a car, trunk, home freezer, commercial food locker, or any other storage method or place.

1.02. Aggregate -- means the total bag or possession limit of any similar kind of game animals or birds. Example: the possession limit for squirrels is 12, after the first day. This could be four gray squirrels, four fox squirrels, and four black squirrels; or any combination of 12 squirrels, but not more than a total of six per day, nor more than a total of 12 in possession.

1.03. Protected -- No open season, hunting at any time shall be illegal for protected wildlife.

1.04. Resident -- means any person who is a citizen of the United States and who has resided continuously in the State of West Virginia for a period of six months or more immediately prior to the date of his application for a license or permit: (Absentee ownership of land in West Virginia does not constitute legal residence.) Provided, that a member of the armed forces of the United States who is stationed beyond the territorial limits of this state, but who was a resident of this state at the time of his entry into such service, and any fulltime student of any college or university of this state, even though he be paying a non-resident tuition, shall be considered a resident under the provisions of this chapter.

1.05. Prevailing time -- prevailing time shall be either Eastern Standard Time or Daylight Saving Time and shall be that time proclaimed by the Governor of the State.

1.06. Non-resident -- means any person, regardless of age or other status, who does not meet the requirements for a resident.

1.07. Concurrent hunting -- hunting of other species during deer gun season.

Section 2. General Hunting Laws and Regulations

2.01. No hunting on State Parks.

2.02. No person may legally take under any conditions more than two deer per calendar year, one by gun and one by bow.

2.03. No person shall hunt deer with a shotgun using ammunition loaded with more than one solid ball, or with any rifle using rimfire ammunition of less than 25 caliber. The use of muzzle-loading rifles is permitted for hunting deer.

2.04. No person shall hunt deer between sunset and sunrise, or kill or wound any deer while the deer is in any stream, lake or pond.

2.05. (a) It shall be unlawful at any time for any person or persons to make use of, or take advantage of, any artificial light in hunting for, locating, taking, trapping, or killing any wild bird or wild animal, except lights ordinarily carried in the hand or on the person may be used for the taking of raccoon, skunk, and opossum.

(b) Or make use of, or take advantage of, any artificial light in hunting for, taking, attracting, trapping, or killing any wild bird or wild animal, or to attempt to do so, while having in his possession or subject to his control any firearm, whether cased or uncased, or other implement or device suitable for taking, killing, trapping, skinning, or dressing such wild bird or animal.

2.06. It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot, hunt, fish, or trap upon the fenced, enclosed or posted grounds of another person or do any other act or thing in conjunction or auxiliary to shooting, hunting, fishing or trapping on such lands without written permission.

2.07. It shall be unlawful at any time for any person to

hunt for, take, kill, wound, or shoot at wild animals or wild birds from an airplane, or other airborne conveyance, an automobile, or other land conveyance, or from a motor-driven water conveyance.

2.08. It shall be illegal for any person to have in his possession a loaded firearm or a firearm from the magazine of which all shells and cartridges have not been removed, in or on any vehicle or conveyance, or its attachment, within the state, except as may otherwise be provided by law or regulation.

2.09. After a person has killed a legal deer by either bow or firearm, he may not participate further in a hunt with either a bow or firearm in his possession the remainder of the day. Such a person may however, pursue his second legal deer any day following, provided it falls within the established season for the weapon in possession or use, and provided the first deer has been legally checked at an official checking station or by a conservation officer.

2.10. Each person killing a deer, bear, or wild turkey found in a wild state shall immediately after removing the entrails, but in any event, within one hour, and before transporting or removing the carcass in any manner from where it was killed, complete and attach a game tag supplied with hunting licenses. The carcass of such game bird or game animal shall be delivered by the person killing said animal to a conservation officer or an official checking station for checking and retagging within 24 hours after killing said deer, bear, or

turkey before it is either skinned or transported beyond the boundaries of the county adjacent to that in which the kill was made.

2.11. No person under the age of fifteen years shall hunt or chase any wild animals or wild birds upon lands of another unless accompanied by an adult possessing a valid hunting license.

2.12. No Sunday hunting, except that raccoon hunting may be continued until 5:00 a.m. on Sunday morning.

2.13. A National Forest Hunting and Fishing License is required in addition to other licenses when hunting or fishing on the Monongahela, George Washington and Jefferson National Forests.

2.14. No warming or other fires permitted on lands belonging to others without written permission of owners.

2.15. It is illegal to smoke any wildlife from dens, trees, rocks, or other cover except that woodchucks or groundhogs may be controlled on private lands by the landowner, his children, or a bona fide resident tenant during the period April 1 through September 30.

2.16. It is illegal to carry an uncased gun in a vehicle between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. from September 30 to July 1. From July 2 to September 29 it is illegal between 8:30 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. prevailing time.

2.17. No person may legally take more than one bear (must be adult) per calendar year. Bear must weigh 100 pounds or more.

2.18. No dog training permitted on game birds and game

animals from May 1 to August 15. However, dogs may be trained on game animals and game birds, except deer and wild turkeys, and field trials may be held or conducted on the grounds or lands of the owner or by his bona fide tenant or tenants or upon the grounds or lands of another person with his written permission or on public lands, at any time: Provided, however, that the person training said dogs does not have firearms or other implements in his possession during the closed season on such game animals and game birds, whereby game animals or game birds could be taken or killed.

2.19. It is illegal to have a bow and gun, or have a gun and any arrow or arrows, in the fields or woods at the same time.

2.20. The use of dogs while bow hunting for black bear shall be unlawful, except during the legal firearms season on the same.

2.21. It shall be unlawful to take any species of wildlife by the use of any poisons or chemicals.

Section 3. General Firearms Regulations

3.01. All seasons, unless otherwise stated, are statewide. The opening and closing dates shall be inclusive, except as noted under exceptions.

3.02. All hunting with firearms and bow shall be unlawful during the period October 6, 1973 through October 12, 1973 inclusive.

3.03. All hunting, except for deer, shall be prohibited

during the first three days of deer gun season in all territories having a firearms deer season. Only deer having one or both antlers three or more inches in length above the hair will be legal game during bucks-only hunting season.

3.04. Concurrent Hunting During Deer Firearms Season:

- (a) No hunting of wild turkeys or bear during deer firearms season.
- (b) Small game hunting permitted beginning November 22, 1973.
- (c) Shot smaller than #4 and slugs may be carried with a shotgun prior to killing a deer during the concurrent hunting period.
- (d) A combination rifle-shotgun (over-under, etc.) is legal for deer hunting and during the concurrent small game period.
- (e) After killing a legal deer, a successful hunter shall not be afield with any type shotgun with solid ball ammunition or shot shells containing larger than #4 shot or, if using a combination rifle-shotgun, he shall not have rifle ammunition in his possession.
- (f) No person shall hunt small game with rifles larger than 22 caliber or shotguns using solid ball ammunition in counties not open to firearms deer hunting during firearms deer season.

3.05. Spring Gobbler Season - Statewide

- (a) Shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to 11:00 a.m.
- (b) No hunters allowed in the woods after 12:00 noon.
- (c) No electronic calling devices or dogs may be used.

3.06. Raccoon Hunting

- (a) Legal only from 6:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. daily.

3.07. Fall Turkey Season

- (a) Electronic calling devices prohibited during fall season.

Section 4. Hunting Seasons

4.01. Squirrels - Gray, Black, Albino, and Fox - October 13, 1973 - January 5, 1974.

4.02. Ruffed Grouse - (native pheasant) - October 13, 1973 - February 23, 1974.

4.03. Wild Turkey - October 13, 1973 - November 17, 1973 - Only in the following counties: Berkeley, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hardy, Mineral, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas (east of State Route #20), Pendleton, Pocahontas, Randolph, Tucker and Webster.

Wild Turkey - October 13, 1973 - October 27, 1973 - Only in Barbour, Braxton, Lewis, Nicholas (between U. S. Route #19 and State Route #20), Preston, and Upshur. Some western counties previously open are closed to fall hunting due to a wild turkey transplanting program.

Spring Gobbler Season - April 23, 1973 - May 12, 1973 - Statewide.

4.04. Bobwhite Quail - November 3, 1973 - February 23, 1974.

4.05. Ring-necked Pheasant (either sex) - November 3, 1973 - January 5, 1974:

4.06. Cottontail Rabbit - November 3, 1974 - February 23, 1974.

4.07. Snowshoe or Varying Hare - November 3, 1973 - February 23, 1974.

4.08. Raccoon Hunting - Open 6:00 p.m. - October 13, 1973 - Closing January 20, 1974 at 5:00 a.m., prevailing time.

4.09. Black Bear - (Adult Animals Only) - Firearms seasons - November 5, 1973 - November 10, 1973. December 10, 1973 - December 22, 1973. Only in the following counties: Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hardy, Monroe, Pendleton, Pocahontas, Randolph, Tucker, and that part of Webster east of Route 20 from Webster Springs southwest of the Nicholas County line, and that section east and south of State Route 15 from Webster Springs to the Randolph County line.

Two exceptions to this are: Cranberry closed area (known as the Back Country) lying in Pocahontas, Greenbrier and Webster Counties and the Spruce Knob closed area lying in Pendleton and Randolph Counties are closed to all bear hunting.

The Cranberry closed area is bounded as follows: Starting at Dyer on Forest Service Route #86, the boundary proceeds along Forest Service Route #86 east to the intersection with Forest Service Route #216; then the boundary follows Forest Service Route #216 to its intersection with Mountain Lick Run. The line then follows Mountain Lick Run to its intersection with the U.S.F.S. boundary and then follows the U.S.F.S. boundary to its intersection with State Route #29/4; then along State Route #29/4 and #39/4 to Forest Service Trail #236. The boundary follows Forest Service Trail #236 northwestward to the Nicholas County line and then proceeds north following the Nicholas County line to Forest Service Route #76; it then follows Forest Service

Route #76 north to Forest Service Route #101. The boundary then follows Forest Service Route #101 north to Dyer.

The Spruce Knob closed area is bounded as follows: Starting at the intersection of U.S. Route #33 and the Spruce Knob National Recreation Area boundary about 8 miles west of the Mouth of Seneca, the boundary follows U.S. Route #33 east to the intersection of U.S. Route #33 and State Route #33/3 and then follows the Spruce Knob Recreation Area boundary south to Forest Service Route #55; the line then follows Forest Service #55 north to Forest Service Route #1; then proceeds west on Forest Service Route #1 to State Route #29. The boundary then follows State Route #29 north to State Route #29/4 north to the Spruce Knob National Recreation boundary; then follows the Spruce Knob National Recreation Area boundary north to U.S. Route #33.

4.10. Red Fox, Gray Fox, Skunk, Opossum, Woodchuck or Groundhog, Bobcat, Weasel - Continuous open season except for the period October 6, 1973 through October 12, 1973. Hunting with a gun or bow is limited to open fields during the closed season on game birds and game animals.

4.11. Elk, Otter, and Wild Boar - No open season, protected.

4.12. Song and Insectivorous Birds - Hawks and Owls - No open season, protected. (English sparrow, European starling, crow, open season year-round.)

4.13. Gallinules, Sora, Virginia Rails, Mourning Doves, Woodcock, Snipe, Ducks and Geese - To be filed at a later date.

4.14. Deer - Firearms season - Bucks only - November 19, 1973 - December 1, 1973 - Only in the following counties: Barbour, Berkeley, Braxton, Brooke, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette (N. of New River), Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha (N. of U.S. 60), Lewis, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam (N. of U.S. 60), Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt and Wood.

Deer - Firearms season - Bucks only - November 19, 1973 - November 24, 1973 - Only in these counties: Boone (E. of U.S. 119), Logan, Mingo, Raleigh, Summers, and Wyoming.

The following counties or parts of counties are closed for deer firearms season: Boone (W. of U.S. 119), Cabell, Fayette (S. of New River), Kanawha (S. of U.S. 60), Lincoln, McDowell, Mercer, Putnam (S. of U.S. 60), and Wayne.

Section 5. Hunting Bag and Possession Limits:

5.01. Deer - One per day, two per season, one with gun and one with bow.

5.02. Squirrels - Gray, Black, Albino, and Fox - Six in aggregate of all species per day. Possession limit is 12 after first day.

5.03. Ruffed Grouse - Native Pheasant - Four per day. Possession limit is eight after first day.

5.04. Wild Turkey - Bag and possession limit: One turkey of either sex in fall season; one bearded turkey in spring season.

5.05. Bobwhite Quail - Seven per day, 14 in possession after first day.

5.06. Ring-necked Pheasant - Two per day, two per season.

5.07. Cottontail Rabbit - Five per day, possession limit ten after first day.

5.08. Varying Hare - Two per day, possession limit four after first day.

5.09. Raccoon - Bag limit during any 11-hour period beginning at 6:00 p.m. and ending at 5:00 a.m. is two raccoons for one person or group of persons as a party and 20 per season, unless otherwise noted. Exception: Grant, Hardy, Morgan, Hampshire, Pendleton, Mineral, Berkeley, Jefferson, Wood, Tyler, Pleasants, Wetzel, Ohio, Brooke, Hancock, Marshall, 4 per day and season limit 40.

5.10. Black Bear - One adult bear by means of gun or bow. Adults weigh 100 pounds or more.

5.11. Mourning Doves, Ducks, Geese, Woodcock, Snipe, Gallinules, Virginia and Sora Rails - Federal Regulations must be considered and State Regulations will be filed later.

Section 6. General Bow and Arrow Hunting Regulations:

6.01. A long bow may be substituted for a gun during any season for which firearms are lawful, except those having already killed a deer with a bow shall not substitute a bow for a gun during the firearms season for deer. It is unlawful to have both a gun and a bow in the field together; hunting with crossbow is illegal.

6.02. Arrows must have at least two sharp cutting edges measuring more than three-fourths of an inch in width, to hunt turkey, bear or deer.

6.03. Unlawful to use arrow with explosive head or shaft.

6.04. Unlawful to shoot across public highway, from aircraft, motor-driven watercraft, motor vehicle or other land conveyance.

6.05. Unlawful to hunt on Sunday except for legal aquatic life.

6.06. Unlawful to kill more than one deer with bow.

6.07. For bow and arrow fishing, a resident is required to have a fishing license; a nonresident is required to have a nonresident bow or gun hunting license or nonresident bow only hunting license.

6.08. Unlawful to have bow in woods, during closed season on game animals and game birds.

Section 7. Bow and Arrow Hunting Seasons:

7.01. Deer - Bow and Arrow - October 13, 1973 - December 31, 1973. Deer of either sex may be hunted statewide with a bow, except that bucks only may be hunted statewide with a bow November 19, 1973 - December 1, 1973 inclusive. Statewide, except that hunting is forbidden on (1) all state parks and game refuges; (2) Harpers Ferry National Monument; (3) all safety zones on state forests and public hunting areas and grounds. All refuges are appropriately marked with official Department signs. The exception noted under deer gun season pertains to bow hunting of bear also.

7.02. Bear - Bow and Arrow - October 13, 1973 - December 31, 1973 - Adult bear only (100 pounds or more). The exception noted under 4.09 pertains to bow hunting of bear also.

7.03. Small Game and Turkey - Bow season coincides with small game firearms season and turkey firearms season respectively.

Section 8. General Trapping Regulations:

8.01. It shall be unlawful to set or maintain more than eight beaver traps or trap sets in counties with season bag limits.

8.02. It shall be unlawful to set or maintain traps, having a jaw spread of more than 4-3/4 inches when open, in or adjacent to any stream inhabited by beavers except during the beaver trapping season. All traps set within an area three feet in diameter shall constitute one trap set. It shall be unlawful: (1) to trap, except on one's own lands, without first having obtained the written permission of the landowner as required by law; (2) to trap within 15 feet of the waterline of any beaver house; or (3) to destroy, disturb, or in any manner interfere with the beaver dam, house or burrow while trapping; (4) to have in possession an untagged beaver hide, or part thereof, between March 24, 1974 and November 3, 1974. All beaver must be tagged prior to selling the pelt. Tags may be obtained from District Conservation Offices and Official Game Checking Stations.

8.03. All traps used for taking game or fur-bearing animals shall be marked with a durable plate or tag, attached to the trap, chain or set, bearing the owner's name and address.

8.04. No nonresident may trap furbearers in West Virginia.

Section 9. Trapping Seasons

9.01. Raccoon Trapping - No traps shall be set before 8:00 a.m., November 3, 1973 or either set or left set after 12:00 noon, February 23, 1974.

9.02. Mink, Muskrat, and Fisher Trapping - No traps shall be set before 8:00 a.m., November 3, 1973 or either set or left set after 12:00 noon, February 23, 1974, prevailing time.

9.03. Beaver Trapping - No traps shall be set before 8:00 a.m., November 3, 1973, or either set or left set after 12:00 noon, February 23, 1974.

Section 10. Trapping Bag and Possession Limits

10.01. Raccoon - Daily (any 24-hour period) and seasonal bag limits for raccoon trapping shall be the same as for hunting.

10.02. Mink and Muskrat - No limit.

10.03. Fisher - Daily limit one; season limit two.

10.04. Beaver - Daily limit (15); season limit (15).

Section 11. Controlled Public Hunting Areas

Rules and regulation governing hunting and trapping on state-owned and leased lands shall be as follows:

(a) Bluestone Public Hunting and Fishing Area - Hunting and trapping as on adjacent lands, except as follows: Woodchuck or groundhog season, October 13, 1973 through January 5, 1974. A free permit to trap furbearers available at area office, Indian Mills.

(b) McClintic Wildlife Station: Hunting as on adjacent lands, except as follows: Waterfowl hunting only in accordance with special rules set up for the Station. Trapping by permit from Area Manager.

(c) Elk River and Corps of Engineers Property (at Sutton Lake, under control of the Division of Wildlife Resources), Fork Creek, Big Ugly, Chief Cornstalk, Nathaniel Mountain, Short Mountain, Pleasants Creek, Sleepy Creek, Lewis Wetzel, Hughes River, Laurel Lake, Plum Orchard, Handley, West Virginia Pulp and Paper (WESTVACO) lands in Hampshire County, Public Hunting and/or Fishing Areas: Hunting as on adjacent lands. No permit is required to hunt. Trapping only under permit which is available from the office of the District Game Manager.

(d) State Forests (Greenbrier, Cabwaylingo, Camp Creek, Cooper's Rock, Kanawha, Kumbrabow, Panther, Cal Price and Seneca): Hunting as on adjacent lands, except as noted below. A free permit available from the Forest Superintendent is required to hunt or trap on all state forests, except Cal Price. Raccoon trapping season closed on all state forests.

Section 12. Class A-1 Small Arms Hunting License Regulations

12.01. Procedure for obtaining a Class A-1 License:

(a) Applicant must be a bona fide resident of West Virginia, 21 years of age or older.

(b) Must possess a valid Class A or AB License, or Senior Citizen License for those residents 65 years of age or older. (Such license must be presented to agent when obtaining Class A-1 License.)

(c) A-1 License may be obtained from any authorized hunting and fishing license agent (excluding county clerks).

(d) Accreditation card must be presented to agent in order to obtain A-1 License. If the accreditation card has not been issued, a valid West Virginia driver's license may be substituted.

(e) The A-1 License must be signed in the presence of the issuing agent.

(f) The cost of Class A-1 License shall be \$5.00 plus 25¢ issuing fee. The license shall expire on December 31 of each year.

12.02. A Class A-1 License shall entitle the licensee to hunt with a pistol or revolver not to exceed .22 caliber (rimfire or center fire) having a barrel at least four inches in length.

12.03. While hunting, the licensee shall carry the .22 caliber pistol or revolver in a holster, outside his person, in an unconcealed and easily visible place. At all other times, the revolver or pistol shall be cased or dismantled in a way to cause it not to operate.

12.04. When being transported in a vehicle, the .22 caliber pistol or revolver shall be unloaded and locked in a compartment not accessible from the inside of such vehicle.

When being transported in a vehicle which does not have an exterior locked compartment, the pistol or revolver shall be unloaded and carried in a locked box or compartment, which shall not be readily accessible to the occupants of the front seat.

When being transported in an off-road recreation vehicle, the pistol or revolver must be unloaded and carried in a locked box or compartment.

12.05. A .22 caliber pistol or revolver may be carried while trapping.

12.06. A .22 caliber pistol or revolver may be used only during small game and big game season, as established.

12.07. It shall be unlawful to:

(a) Take beaver, muskrat, mink or fisher with a .22 caliber pistol or revolver.

(b) Take migratory game birds with a .22 caliber pistol or revolver.

(c) Have a bow and firearm of any kind in the fields or woods at the same time.

(d) Carry a pistol or revolver while fishing.

(e) Take bear or deer with a .22 caliber pistol or revolver.

(f) Carry a .22 caliber pistol or revolver during the first three days of deer season.

(g) To have the .22 caliber pistol or revolver loaded when
not actually hunting.
