**Summary of Proposed Rule**

In 2005, the State Legislature approved W. Va. §20-2-42 of the West Virginia Code to index hunting, fishing and trapping license fees to the rate of inflation with the intent of preventing larger, infrequent fee increases. §20-2-42 provides the authority for the Director to propose legislative rules to change the fees that were established in 2005. The proposed rule would implement that provision of the code by increasing fees for certain hunting, fishing and trapping fees by approximately 8.3 percent, the rate of increase in the Consumer Price index since January 1, 2006. License fees not proposed for an increase would remain at current levels.

**Statement of the Circumstances Which Require This Rule**

In 2005, the State Legislature approved W. Va. §20-2-42 of the West Virginia Code to index hunting, fishing and trapping license fees to the rate of inflation with the intent of preventing larger, infrequent fee increases that have proven to be unpopular and fiscally inefficient. §20-2-42 thus provides the authority for the Director to propose legislative rules to change the fees that were established in 2005. The proposed rule would implement that provision of the code by increasing certain hunting, fishing and trapping fees by approximately 8.3 percent, the rate of increase in the Consumer Price index since January 1, 2006. If approved, the revised fees will take effect January 1, 2010.

The Wildlife Resources and Law Enforcement programs of the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources are dependent upon revenues from the sale of hunting, fishing and trapping licenses. Agency expenditures for these programs have been significantly impacted by inflation. If license revenues do not keep pace with inflation, cuts in agency programs will be necessary. Even with the proposed increases, the adjusted fees will lag behind the actual rate of inflation due to the limitations imposed by the rulemaking process.

**Fiscal Note Summary**

By increasing fees for annual hunting, trapping and fishing licenses in proportion to the increase in the Consumer Price Index, as provided for in section 20-2-42, implementation of the proposed rule will increase the special revenue available to the WV Division of Natural Resources by approximately \$900,000 annually. In 2005, the State Legislature approved W.Va. Section 20-2-42 to provide for indexing of hunting, trapping and fishing license fees to the rate of increase in the Consumer Price Index. The intent was to allow license fees, revenues and the programs that are dependent upon them to keep pace with inflation, while preventing the large, periodic fee increases that would otherwise be necessary. Section 20-2-42 provides the authority for the director of the Division of Natural Resources to propose legislative rules to increase the fees that were established in the 2005 legislative session. This proposed rule would implement that provision by increasing certain hunting, trapping and fishing license and stamp fees by approximately 8.2 percent, the rate of increase in the Consumer Price Index from January, 2006 through April, 2008. The increase would affect fees for resident Class A, B, X, XJ, XXJ, RG, RB and RM licenses or stamps and nonresident Class E, EE, F, H, NN, OO, RRG, RRB, RRM, UU, VV, WW, and CS/LE licenses or stamps. The increased fees would become effective on January 1, 2010. The fiscal effect would be to increase license revenues for the second half of FY 2010 by an estimated \$342,000. The full fiscal impact of the increase would be realized in FY 2011, increasing license revenues by an estimated \$900,000.

Thank you for your thoughtful comments on the proposed increase in hunting and fishing license fees. You are indeed correct that increases are proposed for nonresident hunters and anglers as well as for residents.


Your comments regarding reduced nonresident participation during deer season are duly noted but be aware that most of this reduction occurred prior to the previous increase in license fees, not in response to it. As such, it appears to be more a response to the temporarily reduced seasons and bag limits that are necessary to restore deer numbers to optimum levels than it is a response to pricing. That said, in proposing license fee increases we are extremely sensitive to potential price resistance on the part of license buyers. The current proposal was specifically designed with that in mind. It proposes only an inflationary increase, indexed to the increase in the Consumer Price Index. Our goal, and that of the State Legislature, is to avoid the sticker shock associated with the larger, periodic increases that have employed in the past.

Our fish and wildlife resources and public hunting and fishing areas must be managed to maximize the benefit to hunters and anglers. To continue to provide that management, the Division of Natural Resources must purchase gasoline, fertilizer, equipment, and other items just as individuals do in their own lives and businesses. The license increases being proposed will allow us to continue to provide those services to you and will probably cost you less than the increase in your gasoline costs for one leg of your trip to hunt or fish here.

Dear Mr. Jezioro:

I read in the Times-West Virginian on-line this date that your Division is requesting an increase in hunting license fees starting in 2010. The article addresses only resident fees but, by inference, I suspect you may also be asking that non-resident fees be increased as well. TELL ME IT IS NOT SO!!!

I am a former resident of WV (was born there and went to WVU). I have been hunting there all my life—initially as a resident and for the last many years as a non-resident. In order to deer and turkey hunt, it currently costs \$224 per year for my license. It has been my experience that the motel where we stay while hunting is no longer sold out on the Sunday night before deer rifle season. In fact, many rooms are still available. If one goes back 15 years or so, you had to book your room months in advance to be sure one was available. In general conversation with the motel owner and local residents, it is apparent that many non-resident hunters have simply stopped hunting in WV because of the increased fees witnessed to date. This is not to say that your fees are out of line with other states but, just based on pure economics, I believe non-resident hunters choosing not to hunt in WV will deny you more income than the potential income from increasing the non-resident fees. Of course, it additionally hurts the local economies who would provide lodging, meals, gasoline, etc.

I would suggest you think long and hard before raising the non-resident fees again—I think it is a net loser. And, for those of us who like to get together with the old gang for hunting, it is just an additional penalty and very much unappreciated.

Dear Mr. Squires,

I was forwarded your email for reply regarding the proposed rule to increase lifetime license fees. Your email read as follows:

/If I remember right, when I got my lifetime license, (many, many years ago) the interest from the sale of all lifetime license went to fund land acquisitions for WV sportsman, not compensation for loss of annual license revenue. How did this happen? Please forward this to the proper department for an explanation. Thank you,

/I drafted the original legislation establishing lifetime licenses.

From the very beginning, the investment income from lifetime license fees was designed to compensate for the loss of annual license revenue (which is mostly operating revenue) from lifetime license holders. The fees that have been set for lifetime licenses were set to produce investment income over the buyer's lifetime that would equal the total loss of his or her annual license revenues. That is why the law now requires that lifetime license fees be 23 times the cost of the equivalent annual licenses. It really has to be that way or we wouldn't have enough operating funds to manage the lands that we acquire. I think what you might be remembering about land acquisitions is the creation of the Conservation Stamp, which is required of all licensed sportsmen. That stamp was created about the same time as the lifetime licenses, back in the late eighties. I also drafted that legislation.

The revenue from the Conservation Stamp is indeed used for capital improvements (rifle ranges, access sites) and land acquisitions. One recent example of such a purchase is the 4,600-acre tract being added to the Beury Mountain Wildlife Management Area in Fayette County. Taylor, Chief of the Division's Wildlife Resources Section. The proposed rules will be open for review and written comment until 10 a.m. on July 11, 2008. The availability of the proposed rules will be advertised in the *State Register*. In addition, the proposed rules will be available for review at each DNR district office, the Elkins office and the Charleston office. **Lifetime Hunting, Trapping and Fishing Licenses**

Investment income from lifetime license fees compensates for the loss of annual license revenue. To achieve revenue neutrality, lifetime license fees are required by law W. Va. 20-2B-7 to be 23 times the fees for annual licenses conveying equivalent privileges. Annual license fees are proposed for an inflationary adjustment by rule 58CSR71, thus requiring an accompanying increase in lifetime license fees.



**§58-71-1. General.**

1.1. Scope and Purpose. -- This legislative rule establishes fees of certain hunting, fishing and trapping licenses and stamps.

1.2. Authority. -- W.Va. Code §20-2-42.

1.3. Filing Date --

1.4. Effective Date --

**§58-71-2. Fees for Hunting, Trapping and Fishing Licenses.**

2.1. In accordance with the provisions of W. Va. §20-2-42, the fees for the following hunting, trapping and fishing licenses and stamps are increased and indexed to the increase in the Consumer Price Index (All Items) published by the United States Department of Labor rounded down to the nearest dollar. The Consumer Price Index (All Items) increased by 8.33 percent for the period January 1, 2006 through April 30, 2008.

2.2. The fee for the Class A resident hunting and trapping license is \$19.

2.3. The fee for the Class B resident fishing license is \$19.

2.4. The fee for the Class E nonresident hunting and trapping license is \$119.

2.5. The fee for the Class EE nonresident bear hunting license is \$162.

2.6. The fee for the Class F nonresident fishing license is \$37.

2.7. The fee for the Class H nonresident small game hunting license is \$27.

2.8. The fee for the Class X resident hunting, fishing and trapping license is \$35.

2.9. The fee for the Class XJ resident junior and Class XXJ nonresident junior hunting, fishing and trapping license is \$16.

2.10. The fee for the Class NN nonresident antlerless deer hunting stamp is \$27.

2.11. The fee for the Class OO nonresident trout fishing stamp is \$16.

2.12. The fee for the Class RG resident gun deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$21.

2.13. The fee for the Class RRG nonresident gun deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$43.

2.14. The fee for the Class RB resident archery deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$21.

2.15. The fee for the Class RRB nonresident archery deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$37.

2.16. The fee for the Class RM resident muzzleloader deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$16.

2.17. The fee for the Class RRM nonresident muzzleloader deer hunting stamp for an additional deer is \$37.

2.18. The fee for the Class UU nonresident archery deer hunting stamp is \$32.

2.19. The fee for the Class VV nonresident muzzle-loading deer hunting stamp is \$32.

2.20. The fee for the Class WW nonresident turkey hunting stamp is \$32.

2.21. The fee for the Class CS/LE nonresident conservation law-enforcement and sports education stamp is \$13.

2.22. Fees for licenses and stamps not specified in 2.2 through 2.21 will remain at current levels.
