

§153-13-1. General.

- 1.1. Scope. – This rule establishes criteria to assure neutrality and security in the selection process for early voting in person satellite precincts and establishes processes and deadlines for establishing such precincts.
- 1.2. Authority. – W.Va. Code §3-3-2a(c)
- 1.3. Filing Date. –
- 1.4. Effective Date. –

§153-13-2. Definitions.

- 2.1. For the purposes of this rule:
 - 2.1.1. “Clerk” means the Clerk of the County Commission or other official charged with the administration of elections.
 - 2.1.2. “Early voting” means early in-person absentee voting as provided for in W.Va. Code §3-3-3.
 - 2.1.3. “Published” means a Class II-0 legal advertisement as defined in W.Va. State Code §59-3-2. For counties having more than one qualified newspapers weekly, the notice must be published in each of the qualified newspapers.
 - 2.1.4. “Satellite precinct” means locations for early voting in addition to the primary location as provided for in W.Va. Code §3-3-2a.

§153-13-3. Early Voting Satellite Precinct Selection.

- 3.1. No later than one hundred twenty (120) days prior to election day, the clerk shall submit a proposal for an early voting satellite precinct or precincts to the County Commission for approval or disapproval.
- 3.2. The proposal submitted by the clerk shall include:

- 3.2.1. The proposed location or locations for early voting satellite precincts and the days and hours each precinct will be open;
 - 3.2.2. Provisions for staffing the satellite precinct including a minimum of two persons: *Provided*, That the two persons shall not be registered with the same political party affiliation or two persons registered with no political party affiliation. The persons may be full-time employees of the county or temporary employees hired for the period of early voting or volunteers; and
 - 3.2.3. Any other procedures necessary for the proper conduct of an election according to provisions of W.Va. Code §§3-1, 3-3-2a and 3-3-3, and section five (5) of this rule, at the early voting satellite location or locations.
- 3.3. In order to ensure neutrality in the satellite precinct selection process, the clerk shall also submit to the County Commission with the proposal for an early voting satellite precinct or precincts a duly notarized written agreement from the chairperson of the county executive committee of each of the two major political parties.
 - 3.4. The County Commission shall approve or disapprove the proposal submitted by the clerk no later than 90 days prior to election day. An early voting satellite precinct plan must be approved for each particular primary, general or special election and is only valid for the election for which it was approved.
 - 3.5. If agreement cannot be reached among the County Commission, County Clerk and the chairperson of the county executive committee of each of the two major political parties, the proposal shall be considered void and no early voting satellite precincts shall be authorized in the county for the election cycle.

§153-13-4. Crediting of Voter Record.

- 4.1. Any voter who votes at an early voting satellite precinct shall immediately be given credit in the uniform voter registration system, and the clerk shall take all necessary steps to prevent a voter from voting more than once.

§153-13-5. Procedures for Conducting Early Voting at Satellite Precincts.

- 5.1 All election material and equipment used at any satellite precinct shall be prepared in the same manner as the equipment used during early voting at the primary location including, but not limited to:

- 5.1.1. Provisions for the security of ballots and other election material; and
- 5.1.2. Logistics and accuracy testing of voting equipment.
- 5.2. Counties using paper ballots or optical scan ballots must have copies of each ballot style at the early voting satellite precinct in numbers sufficient for the efficient conduct of early voting.
- 5.3. Each early voting satellite precinct must be open and operational in the same manner as the primary location for early voting, except for differing hours or days approved by the County Commission.
- 5.4. Each early voting satellite precinct must be open for a minimum of three (3) consecutive days per location.
- 5.5. Security of both used and unused ballots, any voting equipment and supplies and all poll books must be maintained in the same manner as at the primary early voting location according to provisions of W.Va. Code §§3-1, 3-3-2a and 3-3-3.

§153-13-6. Public Notice.

- 6.1. Not later than seven (7) calendar days before the start of early voting, the county commission shall cause a notice to be broadcast in a manner sufficient to reach a majority of citizens in the county as determined by the County Commission or published as defined in section two of this rule, and placed on the county's website (if applicable). The notice placed on the county's website must remain on the website until the close of the early voting period. All notices shall state the location or locations and dates and hours of operation for each early voting satellite precinct.

Dear Dave,

After reviewing the proposed rules regarding Satellite Precincts for Early Voting, I have some questions and concerns. Generally speaking, there is little or no criteria for the implementation of such precincts. I will list any such questions or comments I have below:

1. What data/documentation has been used to conclude that early voting needs to be more convenient? Is that information available to the public?
2. The county clerk is responsible for submitting a proposal for early satellite precincts. Who would be permitted to advise the clerk in putting the proposal together, since this is the clerk's sole responsibility?
3. Who is responsible for appointing poll workers at the early satellite precincts?
4. What is a cycle for this purpose: Primary and General? Primary only? General only?
5. What is the length of time the early voting satellite precinct office would be in effect?
 - a. Is the location required to be certified each election?
6. What happens if a person in the satellite location wants to vote at the courthouse (voter registration office)?
7. What is the time period for the two county chairs to review and accept/reject the proposed site (s)?
8. What is the criteria for site(s) selection?
9. Each site has to have internet connectivity in order to report data to the statewide voter registration system. What actions will be implemented to accomplish this?
10. What criteria will be used for the security of the ballots?
11. What plan will be implemented to insure that a person cannot vote at one location and then vote at another one?

I look forward to your response and so do the members of the Kanawha County Republican Executive Committee. It is very important that elections are fair to all voters and that ballot integrity is never compromised.

Registered voters can currently vote by Absentee Ballot. Registered voters can currently vote early within twenty days prior to an election at the Kanawha County Voter Registration Office. Registered voters can also currently vote on Election Day.



Dear Secretary Tennant:

The concept of early voting in satellite locations is progressive and a long stride in improving voting accessibility. All citizens of Kanawha County, regardless of where they reside, will now have an equal opportunity to cast an early ballot. For many years, those voters residing outside of Charleston have been geographically disadvantaged when casting an early ballot.

The requirements for approval of each satellite location will create a solid structure of checks and balances. Through my 35 years of public service, I have learned checks and balances is the foundation of government. I understand the approval of each satellite location will require support from both the Democratic and Republican parties. I am a Republican and I realize there has been some opposition from the Republican Party regarding this issue. I encourage bipartisanship so we can afford more voting opportunities to the citizens of West Virginia. Furthermore, I hope the Secretary of State's Office will take into consideration the differences and similarities of our great State's 55 counties. I have concerns regarding the proposed rule (§153-13-3.5), which would require permanent satellite locations. This rule would make satellite locations cost prohibitive for many, if not all smaller counties.

I compliment the Secretary of State's Office and the Legislature for their progress in increasing voting opportunities. I ask that the Secretary of State's Office reconsiders the proposed rule (§153-13-3.5), and ensure satellite locations can be implemented in all 55 counties.

The Kanawha County Commission thanks you and your staff for your progress and dedication in improving voting accessibility for West Virginia residents. I first proposed the concept of early voting satellite locations to the Legislature and Secretary of State's Office more than five years ago. I feel it is my duty to submit comments because I helped get this law passed. I have serious concerns with the proposed early voting in satellite precinct regulations your office has open for public comment. Specifically, I object to the proposed rule (§153-13-3.5) that would prohibit rotating early voting satellite locations. First, this rule will make early voting satellite locations cost prohibitive. Under the proposed regulations, early voting in satellite precincts will be conducted under a cookie cutter system. Counties in this state vary greatly in terms of size and budget, and rigid regulations will not work well when applied throughout the State.

In addition, rotating early voting locations could prove to be a valuable tool for counties that do not have the resources to simultaneously open several early voting locations. While concerns with voter integrity are always of the greatest importance, North Carolina, which has implemented rotating early voting satellite locations, does not have a single case documented of voter fraud. Early voting satellite locations will be no more secure if they are opened for the entire early voting period rather than a few days.

I submit the following comments:

- County Commissioners should have been included in the discussions regarding these proposed regulations. County Commissions make up one-fourth of the approval committee and are responsible for bearing the costs of early satellite voting locations.

- Any proposed regulations should allow counties to submit their plans concerning rotating satellite locations to the Secretary of State for review and approval. Further, the Elected County Clerk and Elected County Commission should be able to submit their proposal to the Secretary of Secretary before submitting it to political parties for approval.
- Kanawha County has no problem starting out with permanent early voting satellite sites, but we should have the option in the future to rotate locations. Furthermore, I believe there is a great benefit to smaller counties who cannot afford to have multiple early voting sites. The ability to rotate locations would allow smaller counties to maximize their resources while also ensuring ease of voting access for the public. Proposed rule (§153-13-3.5) is an attempt to cost satellite voting out of existence before it starts. All counties should at least have the option of making application for rotating early voting satellite locations.
- While we have talked about satellite locations for the last five years, other states have implemented it. Of the known states that have early voting, 10 allow for rotation of satellite locations. They are as follows: Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, North Carolina, Texas, Utah, Nevada, California, and Nebraska.

We should look to successful examples in neighboring states. Several North Carolina counties have implemented "one-stop" voting. Under the North Carolina system, the one-stop voter casts a ballot in a ballot box or voting system in the same manner as if the box was in use in a precinct on election day. At the end of each day, or when there is no employee or officer of the board of elections present, the ballot box or system is secured in accordance with a plan approved by the State Board of Elections. The plan introduced measures to guarantee for vote integrity, such as ensuring that no additional ballots have been placed in the box. *N.C. Code §163-227.2(e1)*.

In light of being made fun of, I have cited California where they have voting at subway stations. I am not that adventuresome, not quite ready to do what they do in California.

- Random sites could be selected through a drawing similar to how ballot position is determined. It is important that early voting locations be rotated in a way that is fair to the public and does not benefit one area of a county over another.
- What was the true Legislative intent in regard to rotating early voting satellite locations? The Bill, as passed, is silent on this issue.

I am greatly concerned about the implementation process of the regulations. I do not claim to be an expert on the Legislative process. As I understand it, if approval of the

rules follow the same pattern as other rule processes, then these regulations will not be approved before the May 2010 Primary Election. I have not seen any effort to address this time sensitive issue. I suggest these regulations be placed in Special Session to ensure they are approved in a timely manner that will enable voters easy access to the polls in May 2010 Primary Election.

I have enclosed documentation supporting the success of rotating early voting satellite locations in other states. I believe the intent of the Legislature was to assure County Clerks and County Commissions would have substantial input into these regulations before they are implemented. I ask that you strongly consider these suggestions in order to ensure that voting continues to be as accessible as possible for all West Virginia residents.

In the past few days, I have had several correspondences via email with the Don Wright, General Counsel, North Carolina State Board of Elections. Listed below are the comments from Mr. Wright regarding the success of rotating early voting satellite locations.

- "There is no requirement that these sites be rotating. The sites are picked to offer the greatest convenience to the greatest number of voters and to geographically cover a county. As such the locations, if picked properly, should remain constant. What is the variable is the number of sites that are opened. We opened more sites in 2008 than in any other year. Since we have only a US Senate race in 2010, there will not be as many sites opened. The expectation is that in 2012, generally the same number of sites will be opened as there were in 2008."
- "More people voted before election day than on it. This last fact speaks for itself as to the success of locating early voting sites based upon convenience and geography. Voter in small towns or less densely populated parts of the county do not complain because they have access to sites when they travel to shop or work in areas of the county that have sites. "
- "The dates and hours of additional one-stop sites can vary, while the mandated one-stop sites at each county board of elections office must be open each business day and the last Saturday when one-stop ends. The additional one-stop sites are often opened on Saturdays and Sundays and after 5 pm. And can be opened for a few days or the entire period. This is submitted to and approved by the State Board of Elections."

- "The information sent speaks for itself. The success of early voting in North Carolina and other states is based upon offering the voter convenience in voting both as to location and time. In essence, it is offering better "customer service" which more and more citizens are demanding of their public sector. Not only does early voting make it easier on the voter, it creates a positive image of the elections office that seeks to better serve the public. The public appreciates governmental units that try to be proactive in its responsibility to serve the public."

I have enclosed the voter turnout results from the North Carolina 2008 General Election provided by Mr. Wright.

NORTH CAROLINA STATE LAW

§ 163-227.2. Alternate procedures for requesting application for absentee ballot; "one-stop" voting procedure in board office.

(a) Any voter eligible to vote by absentee ballot under G.S. 163-226 may request an application for absentee ballots, complete the application, and vote under the provisions of this section and of G.S. 163-82.6A, as applicable.

(a1) Repealed by Session Laws 2001-337, s. 2, effective January 1, 2002.

(b) Not earlier than the third Thursday before an election, in which absentee ballots are authorized, in which a voter seeks to vote and not later than 1:00 P.M. on the last Saturday before that election, the voter shall appear in person only at the office of the county board of elections, except as provided in subsection (g) of this section. A county board of elections shall conduct one-stop voting on the last Saturday before the election until 1:00 P.M. and may conduct it until 5:00 P.M. on that Saturday. That voter shall enter the voting enclosure at the board office through the appropriate entrance and shall at once state his or her name and place of residence to an authorized member or employee of the board. In a primary election, the voter shall also state the political party with which the voter affiliates and in whose primary the voter desires to vote, or if the voter is an unaffiliated voter permitted to vote in the primary of a particular party under G.S. 163-119, the voter shall state the name of the authorizing political party in whose primary he wishes to vote. The board member or employee to whom the voter gives this information shall announce the name and residence of the voter in a distinct tone of voice. After examining the registration records, an employee of the board shall state whether the person seeking to vote is duly registered. If the voter is found to be registered that voter may request that the authorized member or employee of the board furnish the voter with an application form as specified in G.S. 163-227. The voter shall complete the application in the presence of the authorized member or employee of the board, and shall deliver the application to that person.

(c) If the application is properly filled out, the authorized member or employee shall enter the voter's name in the register of absentee requests, applications, and ballots issued and shall furnish the voter with the ballots to which the application for absentee ballots applies. The voter thereupon shall vote in accordance with subsection (e) of this section.

All actions required by this subsection shall be performed in the office of the board of elections, except that the voting may take place in an adjacent room as provided by subsection (e) of this section. The application under this subsection shall be signed in the presence of the chair, member, director of elections of the

board, or full-time employee, authorized by the board who shall sign the application and certificate as the witness and indicate the official title held by him or her. Notwithstanding G.S. 163-231(a), in the case of this subsection, only one witness shall be required on the certificate.

(d) Only the chairman, member, employee, or director of elections of the board shall keep the voter's application for absentee ballots in a safe place, separate and apart from other applications and container-return envelopes. If the voter's application for absentee ballots is disapproved by the board, the board shall so notify the voter stating the reason for disapproval by first-class mail addressed to the voter at that voter's residence address and at the address shown in the application for absentee ballots; and the board shall enter a challenge under G.S. 163-89.

(e) The voter shall vote that voter's absentee ballot in a voting booth in the office of the county board of elections, and the county board of elections shall provide a voting booth for that purpose, provided however, that the county board of elections may in the alternative provide a private room for the voter adjacent to the office of the board, in which case the voter shall vote that voter's absentee ballot in that room. A voter at a one-stop site shall be entitled to the same assistance as a voter at a voting place on election day under G.S. 163-166.8. The State Board of Elections shall, where appropriate, adapt the rules it adopts under G.S. 163-166.8 to one-stop voting.

(e1) If a county uses a voting system with retrievable ballots, that county's board of elections may by resolution elect to conduct one-stop absentee voting according to the provisions of this subsection. In a county in which the board has opted to do so, a one-stop voter shall cast the ballot and then shall deposit the ballot in the ballot box or voting system in the same manner as if such box or system was in use in a precinct on election day. At the end of each business day, or at any time when there will be no employee or officer of the board of elections on the premises, the ballot box or system shall be secured in accordance with a plan approved by the State Board of Elections, which shall include that no additional ballots have been placed in the box or system. Any county board desiring to conduct one-stop voting according to this subsection shall submit a plan for doing so to the State Board of Elections. The State Board shall adopt standards for conducting one-stop voting under this subsection and shall approve any county plan that adheres to its standards. The county board shall adhere to its State Board-approved plan. The plan shall provide that each one-stop ballot shall have a ballot number on it in accordance with G.S. 163-230.1(a2), or shall have an equivalent identifier to allow for retrievability. The standards shall address retrievability in one-stop voting on direct record electronic equipment where no paper ballot is used.

(e2) A voter who has moved within the county more than 30 days before election day but has not reported the move to the board of elections shall not be required on that account to vote a provisional ballot at the one-stop site, as long as

the one-stop site has available all the information necessary to determine whether a voter is registered to vote in the county and which ballot the voter is eligible to vote based on the voter's proper residence address. The voter with that kind of unreported move shall be allowed to vote the same kind of absentee ballot as other one-stop voters.

(f) Notwithstanding the exception specified in G.S. 163-36, counties which operate a modified full-time office shall remain open five days each week during regular business hours consistent with daily hours presently observed by the county board of elections, commencing with the date prescribed in G.S. 163-227.2(b) and continuing until 5:00 P.M. on the Friday prior to that election and shall also be open on the last Saturday before the election. A county board may conduct one-stop absentee voting during evenings or on weekends, as long as the hours are part of a plan submitted and approved according to subsection (g) of this section. The boards of county commissioners shall provide necessary funds for the additional operation of the office during that time.

(g) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, a county board of elections by unanimous vote of all its members may provide for one or more sites in that county for absentee ballots to be applied for and cast under this section. Every individual staffing any of those sites shall be a member or full-time employee of the county board of elections or an employee of the county board of elections whom the board has given training equivalent to that given a full-time employee. Those sites must be approved by the State Board of Elections as part of a Plan for Implementation approved by both the county board of elections and by the State Board of Elections which shall also provide adequate security of the ballots and provisions to avoid allowing persons to vote who have already voted. The Plan for Implementation shall include a provision for the presence of political party observers at each one-stop site equivalent to the provisions in G.S. 163-45 for party observers at voting places on election day. A county board of elections may propose in its Plan not to offer one-stop voting at the county board of elections office; the State Board may approve that proposal in a Plan only if the Plan includes at least one site reasonably proximate to the county board of elections office and the State Board finds that the sites in the Plan as a whole provide adequate coverage of the county's electorate. If a county board of elections has considered a proposed Plan or Plans for Implementation and has been unable to reach unanimity in favor of a Plan, a member or members of that county board of elections may petition the State Board of Elections to adopt a plan for it. If petitioned, the State Board may also receive and consider alternative petitions from another member or members of that county board. The State Board of Elections may adopt a Plan for that county. The State Board, in that plan, shall take into consideration factors including geographic, demographic, and partisan interests of that county. The State Board of Elections shall not approve, either in a Plan approved unanimously by a county board of elections or in an alternative Plan proposed by a member or members of that board, a one-stop site in a building

that the county board of elections is not entitled under G.S. 163-129 to demand and use as an election-day voting place, unless the State Board of Elections finds that other equally suitable sites were not available and that the use of the sites chosen will not unfairly advantage or disadvantage geographic, demographic, or partisan interests of that county.

(h) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 163-89(a) and (b), a challenge may be entered against a voter at a one-stop site under subsection (g) of this section or during one-stop voting at the county board office. The challenge may be entered by a person conducting one-stop voting under this section or by another registered voter who resides in the same precinct as the voter being challenged. If challenged at the place where one-stop voting occurs, the voter shall be allowed to cast a ballot in the same way as other voters. The challenge shall be made on forms prescribed by the State Board of Elections. The challenge shall be heard by the county board of elections in accordance with the procedures set forth in G.S. 163-89(e).

(i) At any site where one-stop absentee voting is conducted, there shall be a curtained or otherwise private area where the voter may mark the ballot unobserved. 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Alameda County Tries New Strategies to Increase Voter Participation

At 7 a.m., one of the commuters stepped up to a bunting-draped table piled high with pamphlets. She filled out a form and handed it to someone from the office of the Alameda County Registrar of Voters. Even though the election was weeks away, the commuter had just voted.

"Just like clockwork," said David Robillard, part of the 4-person team working at Alameda County's mobile voting unit—a new early voting opportunity.

Consider it a campaign where they don't care how you vote.

This year Alameda County joined a handful of more adventuresome counties that have moved early voting stations into unorthodox places, such as malls, transit stations and college campuses. Elections officials see the mobile voting unit as a way to boost voter participation by bringing the polls out to the public.

"I was very surprised when I walked in. And delighted," said Billie Vincent, the Fremont resident who was the morning's first voter.

During its first hour at the BART station, the mobile voting unit snagged an early voter every 10 minutes.

Oakland resident Garry Jackson, 50, used downtime between a BART ride and a bus the rest of the way to work in San Jose to cast a ballot.

"If I can get it done now and not have to go to the polling station and wait in line, that's great," said Jackson.

California law allows voters to cast a ballot starting 29 days before an election, but such early voting is largely done in county elections offices.

According to the California Secretary of States office, only 13 of California's 58 counties offer early voting at satellite locations—places outside the local registrar's office. But local elections officials install the bulk of these satellite locations in city halls, public libraries, and the like.

Alameda County first set up satellite early voting five years ago. Guy Ashley, a spokesman with the Alameda County Registrar of Voters, described the turnout at the traditional satellite early voting sites as "paltry."

"You don't just wander down to city hall to do stuff. Unless you have permits to file or taxes to pay, you're not going there," said Ashley.

The poor showing in this year's primary—in which only 28-percent of the county's eligible voters participated—spurred acting registrar of voters Alameda County David MacDonald.

"The idea was really to give people more opportunities to vote, to try something a little creative," said MacDonald. The county would try taking their voting booths to the people.

Alameda County has been quick to adopt new ideas in voting, but with some mixed results. Four years ago, the county paid \$12 million for new touch-screen voting machines, which miscast some ballots in the 2003 recall election. After changes in voting regulations requiring all electronic voting machines to create a paper record, the county had to spend another \$13 million to replace the original Diebold-made machines with machines from Oakland-based Sequoia Systems. Both the Diebold and Sequoia systems faced repeated court challenges over security.

While paper ballot scanners will be used for polls on Election Day, the mobile voting unit uses the touch screen machines normally reserved for voters with disabilities.

Both Orange and Riverside counties in southern California have embraced early voting in less traditional satellite locations. And voters in both counties have taken to the change.

Riverside elections officials first set up voting in shopping malls in 2000. And last fall they offered limited debut of ROVER, a custom built RV outfitted with five voting booths—paid for by a \$173,000 grant from the county's Indian gaming committee.

For the 2004 general election, three of the four mall-based voting stations in Riverside County took in more early voting ballots than did the registrar's office. In total, more than 22,000 of the county's voters cast their ballot at malls.

That same year Orange County rolled out an ambitious array of early voting satellite stations, with 30 locations ranging from supermarkets to malls to John Wayne Airport.

While logistical problems with the supermarkets led Orange County to drop those locations this year, spokesman Brett Rowley said the airport has proved one of the most popular early voting sites.

"When we scaled back the sites this year, people wanted to make sure that we kept the airport," said Rowley.

But even with the more successful programs like Riverside, there have been difficulties.

ROVER's first outing this year at a county office in downtown Riverside drew only 11 voters. Sue Martine, who coordinates ROVER for the county, said that the low numbers were probably due to the fact that residents are just now getting their voter information packets, which have the ROVER schedule.

Satellite voting locations in Alameda, Orange and Riverside counties, whether mobile or at the mall, rely on similar technology to make sure that voters just vote once in an election.

Before poll workers give an early voter a ballot, they connect to the county's central voter registration database via a secure connection. Once they confirm the registration, they issue the voter a ballot and mark the name as having voted—preventing anyone from voting multiple times.

This process also separates verification from the actual voting, keeping ballots anonymous.

Thomas Patterson, professor at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and author of "The Vanishing Voter," has tracked the steady decades-long decline in voter participation.

Patterson said expanded early voting opportunities can add to voter participation, but factors outside the control of elections officials drive larger voting fluctuations. A potential change in the control of Congress, for example, will bring more voters out.

Even with these fluctuations, Patterson found that states can successfully encourage voter participation.

"The states that have same-day registration, they're leading," said Patterson, who cited a 15-percent higher voter participation rate in the six states that allow voters to register on election day.

A study published last year by the California Voter Foundation looked at the flip side of the question—why people don't vote.

According to the survey, one in four of California's infrequent registered voters (those who voted in zero or one of the previous four elections) cited being too busy to vote. The survey also noted that 16-percent of infrequent voters worked more than 50 hours per week.

Laila Berrios, a student full-time nursing student at Cal State University East Bay (CSUEB), fits the profile.

Beyond her classes, the 27-year old mother of two has a clinical rotation and said she wouldn't have time to vote on Election Day. She stopped at the mobile voting unit, but as a Contra Costa resident she couldn't use Alameda County's polls.

"I figure I'll let this vote go by," said Barrio.

Over the two days at Cal State University of the East Bay, more than 65 votes were cast at the

mobile voting unit, which was set up at the entrance of the student union. Campus organizers and school administrators sent out a broadcast email announcing that the mobile voting unit would be on campus.

During the second day on campus, the county's new printer-equipped voting machines caused a backlog when one of the machines ran out of paper. As the line backed up, some busy students who would have voted on their lunch break decided not to wait.

Thomas Lind, 38-year old student in the teaching program, did wait.

"I wanted to give them the numbers they needed to keep this thing going," said the self-described idealist. Lind said that he believes that the ease of these kinds of early voting machines will improve voter participation, and lead to a "better democracy."

The success at CSUEB contrasts with an afternoon at MacArthur BART and a full day at Berkeley's Center for Independent Living, which provides services to people with disabilities. At each of those stops, only three people cast early votes.

With three days left on the mobile voting tour, 166 residents had taken advantage of the mobile voting unit—far less than a single day at the Riverside set-up at the Galleria Mall where elections officials camp out for more than a week.

Elections officials say that the novelty of the program (at the BART stations many commuters thought the mobile voting unit was just a voter registration stand) and the fact that mobile voting unit spent only one day at most locations worked against them.

Then there was the size of this year's ballot. With 13 state Initiatives and an overwhelming 191-page state voter guide, many voters simply were not ready for early voting.

"It does clash directly with the theme that we were acting on, which was being there and having people vote spontaneously," said Ashley.

Despite the small numbers this year, county registrar MacDonald said he considers the experiment worthwhile, and plans to expand it for the next election.

In the rush of election season, MacDonald hasn't had time to consider how many man-hours are being put into the 15-stop mobile voting tour. He doesn't see it as relevant.

"How do you put a price tag on the value of giving people the opportunity to vote?" said MacDonald.

Over the last decade, at best 60-percent of the county's eligible voters participated in elections; at worst, less than 30-percent.

"A very small percentage of eligible voters are determining elections, and anything we can do to increase that turnout, I think we should do it," said MacDonald.
