I agree that this shows a mastery of those skills. I believe it should be a goal of every student and of me as an instructor. But to expect a high percentage of our students to pass this test in a two-year program as high school students is setting up for failure. Over the 25 years that I have been teaching the percentage of students passing these test has went down. Fifteen years ago maybe 60-70% would pass one of the tests mentioned. Over the past 5 years that has shrunk down to around 15-20%. There are many reasons for this that I don't have time to go into but include high rates of absence problems, lack of interest, high rate of special needs students and the time devoted to other content standards not related to the welding skills. I know many may water the test down so students can pass. But I believe in the integrity of the test and may job and will not do that. There are many welders working everyday that cannot pass the above test. That is the difference between making \$10.00/hr and \$35.00/hr. I have 40 years welding experience and still learn new information and techniques each day. 

I have concerns over the mastery performance including the SMAW and GMAW WV State certifications. I agree that this shows a mastery of those skills. I believe it should be a goal of every student and of me as an instructor. But to expect a high percentage of our students to pass this test in a two-year program as high school students is setting us up for failure. Over the 25 years that I have been teaching the percentage of students passing these test has went down. Fifteen years ago maybe 60-70% would pass one of the tests mentioned. Over the past 5 years that has shrunk down to around 15-20%. There are many reasons for this that I don't have time to go into but include high rates of absence problems, lack of interest, high rate of special needs students and the time devoted to other content standards not related to the welding skills. I know many may water the test down so students can pass. But I believe in the integrity of the test and my job and will not do that. There are many welders working everyday that cannot pass the above test. That is the difference between making \$10.00/hr and \$35.00/hr. I have 40 years welding experience and still learn new information and techniques each day. A career in welding is not made in these 2 years, but rather the desire to be a lifelong learner in welding is developed. Maybe I am reading this wrong and our programs will not be judged by a certain percentage of students having to pass these test.
