

Proclamation

by Governor Patrick Morrisey

- Whereas,** kidney disease affects an estimated 37 million Americans, and more than 550,000 are on dialysis; and
- Whereas,** African Americans with kidney disease are more likely to develop kidney failure than any other racial/ethnic group; and
- Whereas,** the health disparities in kidney failure are unsustainable, with African Americans making up 13 percent of the United States population but accounting for 35 percent of those with kidney failure; and
- Whereas,** kidney failure places enormous physical, emotional, and financial burdens on individuals and costs the Medicare program over \$50 billion annually; and
- Whereas,** there are genetic factors that can increase an individual's risk for kidney disease, one being variants (mutations) in the apolipoprotein L1 (APOL1) gene; and
- Whereas,** these variants can increase susceptibility for APOL1-Mediated Kidney Disease (AMKD), a rapidly progressive form of kidney disease that can lead to kidney failure; and
- Whereas,** it is estimated that if a patient has variants in both copies of the APOL1 gene, there is a 1 in 5 chance they will go on to develop kidney disease, and an estimated 13 percent of African Americans have variants in both copies of the APOL1 gene; and
- Whereas,** a person with AMKD may not have any symptoms of kidney disease until their kidneys are close to failing.



APOL1-Mediated Kidney Disease Awareness Day

in the Mountain State and encourage all citizens to join me in observance.
